17.Skill development:

Swami Vivekanand Subharti University is dedicated to fostering holistic education by offering a diverse array of skill development courses across various programs. Tailored to enhance the proficiency of our students, these courses encompass a wide range of disciplines.

For Bachelor of Technology (B.Tech.) students, specialized skill development courses include advance programming languages, digital marketing, cyber security, cloud computing, etc. Master of Business Administration (MBA) students can engage in courses such as entrepreneurship development, financial management, strategic management, marketing management, etc. Master of Technology (M.Tech.) students are presented with opportunities to delve into advanced programming languages, machine learning, artificial intelligence, data science, etc.

The skill development curriculum extends to Bachelor of Commerce (B.Com.) students with courses in taxation, financial analysis, business communication, etc. Bachelor of Education (B.Ed.) students benefit from courses focusing on teaching methods, classroom management, curriculum development, etc. Bachelor of Pharmacy (B. Pharm.) students can choose from courses like pharmaceutical marketing, pharmacology, pharmaceutical chemistry, etc. Law students are offered specialized courses in legal writing, legal research, legal ethics, etc.

Consistency in this approach is maintained across all programs

administered by the diverse faculties and colleges within the University.

Beyond these, the University provides a comprehensive selection of 24 vocational courses. These courses are meticulously designed to offer hands-on training and practical experience, equipping students with the essential skills needed for a prosperous and fulfilling career. Our commitment to skill development ensures that students are well-prepared to navigate the complexities of their chosen fields and emerge as successful professionals in their respective domains.

18.Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course)

Swami Vivekanand Subharti University places a strong emphasis on integrating the Indian knowledge system (IKS) into its curriculum. This integration is achieved through courses in Indian languages, culture, and heritage, incorporating teachings of ancient Indian scholars and philosophers, including Vedic Astrology, Indian spiritual traditions, Indian literature, and Indian history. Faculties, colleges, departments, hostels, roads, buildings, and intersections within the university campus are named after a historical personality who has made significant contributions to the freedom struggle or the development of the nation, with detailed descriptions and pictures displayed. The Administrative Block of the University is designated as the Ashfaqullah Khan Block. This nomenclature extends to various facilities, exemplified by names such as Lachit and Uddham Singh Boys Hostel, Madan Lal Dhillon Boys Hostel, Veer Hakeem Rai Boys Hostel, Rani Chennamma Girls Hostel, Bhagini Nivedita Girls Hostel, Col. Lakshmi Sehgal Girls Hostel, Savitri Bai Phule Girls Hostel, Ahilya Bai Holkar Girls Hostel, Begum Hazrat Mahal Girls Hostel, Chhatrapati Shivaji Subharti Hospital, Durga Bhagwati Shopping Complex, Chandrashekar Road, Rani Avanti Bai Marg, Helen Lepeha Road, Bahama Shah road, Tatya Tope Tiraha, etc. and several others.

Workshops, seminars, quizzes, essay competitions, and the celebration of Subharti Day every month provide students with opportunities to interact with experts, learning from their experiences and insights about the true and great sacrifices of Indian legends. This is facilitated through a dedicated department called Sanskriti Vibhag. The university has implemented a mandatory multidisciplinary value-added course called "Rashtrabodh" for all enrolled students, regardless of

their academic disciplines. This course aligns with the principles outlined in the National Education Policy-2020 (NEP-2020) and centers around the exploration of the Indian Knowledge System (IKS) as well as Indian Heritage and Culture.

Courses like Gender Studies, Childhood and Growing Up, Community Health Nursing, Child Health Nursing, Legal Sociology, and Family Law—First Law of Marriage and Divorce, are specifically designed to address gender sensitivity issues. Moreover, the Gender Sensitization Cell regularly conducts workshops focusing on gender-related matters.

Environmental Studies is a compulsory subject across all disciplines, ensuring that students are educated and sensitized towards environmental sustainability.

Furthermore, the university actively involves students and faculty members in outreach activities such as health services, free distribution of medicines, medical camps, rural postings, etc., to enhance their community interaction and understanding.

The University actively encourages field visits, research projects, industry internships, and community postings as integral components of the curriculum, aimed at bridging any existing gap between academia and industry. Throughout the academic year, over 4000 students seized the opportunity to either visit industries, gain insights into real-time operations, engage in research projects, or participate in industry internship programs.

Regular field visits to Primary Health Centers (PHCs), Urban Health Centers (UHCs), Community Health Centers (CHCs), and District Hospitals expose students to healthcare delivery at both urban and rural levels.

Additionally, visits to Anganwadi centers, old-age homes, prisons, and other community settings are integral components of the curriculum for students in Medicine, Dental Science, Physiotherapy, AYUSH, Nursing, Law, and Education programs. These visits aim to raise awareness about specific healthcare needs, legal considerations, and educational initiatives within society.

In non-medical disciplines, students engage in mini projects, field visits, and industry internships as mandatory components of their second-year and final research endeavors.

Our collaborations with renowned industries such as Dabur Research Foundation, KPS Clinical Services Pvt. Ltd., Sun Pharmaceuticals Ltd., and academic institutions like Jamia Hamdard University, Rajiv Gandhi Law University, Astitva Foundation, facilitate research opportunities, field visits, and internships through student exchange programs. Furthermore, international partnerships with institutions like John Hopkins University, Dhammachai International Research Institute Australia, Dong Bang Buddhist University, and South Korea, among others, enable faculty and student exchanges, enriching the academic experience and fostering global perspectives.

The university's approach encompasses a wide array of student-centric techniques, such as seminars, case studies, field and industrial projects, live-case discussions, educational excursions, participation in intra and inter-university activities, expert talks, workshops, brainstorming sessions, role-playing, and group discussions.

Integrated and interdisciplinary learning, aligned with the Credit-Based Choice System (CBCS) and the National Education Policy (NEP), involves Skill and Ability enhancement and Generic electives courses, fostering cross-disciplinary collaboration and content delivery.

For instance, within the realm of experiential learning, initiatives such as Longitudinal Patient Care, where groups of postgraduate students in the medical field are mentored by doctors throughout a patient's journey from admission to discharge, exemplify the hands-on approach adopted to enhance learning outcomes. Similarly, the Faculty of Science organized an activity focusing on Electronic Spectra of Transition Metal Complexes, aimed at fostering participatory learning among its students. Furthermore, the Faculty of Education employed student-centric methodologies such as Problem-Solving through Microteaching activities to cultivate critical thinking and practical skills among their students. We emphasize evidence-based learning by involving students in patient evaluation, monitoring, therapeutic administration, quality assessment, and clinical trials, thereby enhancing their understanding of patient care outcomes.

Additionally, platforms like Google Meet, WebEx, and Zoom are employed for conducting Value Added Courses, mentoring sessions, and counseling sessions, as well as co-curricular and extracurricular activities such as webinars and workshops, enriching students' overall learning experiences.

The university libraries are fully automated and offer seamless access to a plethora of resources, including textbooks, reference materials, print journals, and subscribed e-resource databases like EBSCO, DELNET, and SCC, catering to the needs of both students and faculty members alike.

Moreover, students are provided with detailed explanations of program learning outcomes and graduate attributes during orientation programs. Furthermore, a multitude of workshops, orientation sessions, refresher courses, and faculty development programs on Outcome-Based Education (OBE) have been organized by the Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) to equip faculty members with the necessary tools and insights to effectively implement these principles in their teaching practices.

The university has established a comprehensive research policy aimed at providing robust support and a structured framework for research endeavors. Substantial budgetary allocations are earmarked specifically for research and development activities, ensuring adequate resources are available to facilitate scholarly pursuits.

Our research infrastructure is both ample and state-of-the-art, comprising facilities for pre-clinical trials, well-equipped laboratories outfitted with the latest equipment, and specialized

research centers tailored to support diverse fields of inquiry. To further bolster research excellence and productivity, the University Research Council has been established, tasked with overseeing and evaluating the performance of faculty members, scholars, and students engaged in research activities.

A systematic approach to fostering research excellence is adopted through a series of workshops and seminars, which emphasize good research practices, ethical considerations, clinical and laboratory protocols, intellectual property rights (IPR), research methodology, and industry-academic collaboration. Additionally, the university organizes guest lecture series featuring distinguished scientists to enrich the research capacity of our academic community.

Central to our research promotion efforts is the Central Research and Incubation Center (CRIC), serving as a centralized hub for interdisciplinary research initiatives. Under this framework, various support mechanisms are in place, including seed funding for faculty and students, scholarships for Ph.D. scholars, financial assistance for conferences, publication and patent incentives, and research awards.

The University has established clear and comprehensive policy guidelines regarding Intellectual Property Rights (IPR) and Consultancy, fostering a conducive environment for research promotion with equitable revenue-sharing mechanisms between institutions and individuals.

The IPR policy serves as a foundational framework, facilitating a shared understanding of IP concepts, rights, and incentives among researchers. It addresses key issues such as ownership, confidentiality, IP management, commercialization, revenue sharing, recording and maintenance of IP, legal protection, and conflicts of interest. Moreover, the policy aims to cultivate reflection and critical thinking, ensure clarity regarding IP ownership, and promote responsible commercialization of research outcomes through capacity-building initiatives.

Additionally, the university has formulated a structured consultancy policy encompassing various categories such as Individual Consultancy, Institutional/Departmental Consultancy, Testing and Evaluation/Calibration, and Analysis and Characterization of Samples. The revenue-sharing mechanism for consultancy services is clearly outlined in the policy, with funds collected through bank drafts/cheques or cash receipts, ensuring transparency and accountability.

To further enhance awareness and understanding of IP generation and management, as well as consultancy practices, the university regularly organizes capacity-building programs. These initiatives aim to sensitize students and faculty members across diverse disciplines including Medicine, Dentistry, Pharmacy, Physiotherapy, Nursing, Fine Arts, Management, Science, Engineering, and Technology.

Engineering labs foster innovation and the Physical Education department offers extensive sports facilities. Even the Department of Agriculture has a dedicated area for practical training. Research is centralized, and IT support ensures seamless learning. The extensive library network caters to diverse disciplines, bolstered by online resources. Amidst the COVID-19 pandemic, the University swiftly adapted with an e-library and online learning platforms.

Subhartipuram campus sprawls across 250 acres of meticulously landscaped grounds, boasting eco-friendly architecture and sustainable practices. These libraries offer a range of services, including internet access to databases like EBSCO, DELNET, J-Gate, Sage Database, India E-Library, SCOPUS, and SCC Online. They also provide access to Shodhganga and E-Shodhsindhu. In-house services such as plagiarism checking, circulation, reference, reprography, and digital library facilities are available.

The libraries are equipped with KOHA, an open-source library automation system used worldwide by various institutions. KOHA supports MARC format for catalogue data and offers web-based access through browser clients. It includes modules for acquisitions, circulation, cataloguing, serials management,

authorities, reporting, label printing, and more. KOHA is multilingual, translatable, and compliant with library standards, ensuring interoperability with other systems. Its web-based interfaces are built using standard web technologies, making it platform-independent.

KOHA is fully functional and complete automation was implemented in our University in the 2020-21. Plans are underway to enhance library security with digital flap barrier integration and RFID for entry and book issue management. Overall, the libraries at the University are well-equipped with modern technology and resources to support the academic and research needs of faculty, students, and scholars.

Swami Vivekanand Subharti University has a robust IT infrastructure to support teaching, learning, and administrative processes. With over 300 WiFi access points installed across the campus, hostels, and colleges, students can enjoy free internet access via mobile OTP login. The university utilizes Cisco Meraki network infrastructure, including the latest MX-450 Firewall and over 50 MS-125 Switches at the core distribution layer and 60

switches at the access layer, connected through a 10G fibre optic network on a mesh topology. There are more than 1900 computers across the University for Use with access to the standard software and Internet access.

The campus is fully WiFi-enabled, providing 24x7 internet access. IT facilities are regularly upgraded, overseen by an in-house IT cell led by a Chief Technical Officer and a team of technical experts. The infrastructure includes Dlink access points for secure WiFi coverage using MAC authentication, digital flap barriers for library security, and tablets for paperless conferences. The S-Touch Mobile App facilitates communication for staff, while a 2GBPS bandwidth ensures high-speed connectivity.

Other upgrades include a firewall upgrade, Cisco Meraki installation, and the implementation of 10G Cisco L3 and L2 switches for better connectivity. The university has also upgraded its call center with IVRS facilities and customized online examination software. The library automation system has been upgraded from Libsys to Koha, and IP surveillance with audio capabilities has been implemented. Access control systems have been upgraded with biometric authentication, and digital kiosk machines have been installed in every college for student convenience and ERP integration.

Students have unrestricted access to hostel facilities, though permission from the warden is required for organizing group programs, as stipulated in official notifications. Laboratories adhere to standard operating procedures for furnishing and maintenance, while the Library, overseen by the Librarian, establishes administrative and maintenance policies through biannual committee meetings. The Sports Committee manages routine maintenance of sports facilities and equipment.

The Information Technology Department, led by the Chief Technical Officer, addresses IT-related matters such as computer lab upkeep and in-house ERP systems. A maintenance committee oversees repairs and upkeep of all campus facilities.

Utility departments maintain thorough logbook records, documenting the receipt of issue calls and the time taken for resolution, ensuring accountability and efficiency.

The Finance and Executive Committees of the University ensure that resources are utilised to the utmost extent possible. Every component college establishes a budget for operations related to instruction, research, and facility improvement. Fee collection (registration fees, tuition fees, transfer fees, migration fees, annual fees, processing fees, medal deposits, donations, examination fees, fines and penalties, evaluation fees, convocation fees, sports, and so forth) is the main method used to

mobilise internal resources, whereas research funds and consulting fees are the main sources of external revenue. Additional sources include government subsidies for professional and educational programmes, government efforts for certain hospital treatment facilities, and certain philanthropic gifts to universities and hospitals. The Purchase Committees provide the full and optimal use of the available resources. In order to determine the genuine value for money, the committee obtains quotations from many suppliers and verifies the amount, quality, technical details, and specifications of numerous goods. All expensive things are paid for using AMC/CMC by the university. Every item that breaks down is delivered to the University's maintenance and repair unit for repair. Items that are deemed irreparable are subsequently delivered to the Condemnation Board for ultimate disposal.

6.4.3 - Institution conducts internal and external financial audits regularly

The University undertakes its own internal audit mechanism annually to evaluate and certify the income-expenditure and capital expenditure in order to maintain checks and balances in the internal working. Under the direction of certified internal auditors, a team of experts thoroughly examines and verifies every voucher pertaining to the transactions of every fiscal year. The compliance report is delivered to the principals of the constituent units as well as the university after the income and spending figures have been carefully checked. The University has a strong internal auditing system in place, but it has also hired a third-party professional organisation to conduct routine external audits. This agency operates autonomously and provides the Hon'ble Vice Chancellor with confidential reports. The relevant supporting documentation is made available for any questions. When the audit team finds minor errors or omissions and commissions, precautions are taken, rectification is completed right away, and care is taken to prevent similar problems in the future. In addition to assisting the external auditors in accomplishing justifiable goals with the least amount of disruption to business, the finance officer collaborates with them.

Swami Vivekanand Subharti University upholds a rigorous waste

management system rooted in environmental stewardship. We diligently implement the principles of the 3Rs: Reduce, Reuse, and Recycle. We actively contribute to the National Mission and objectives of Swachh Bharat Abhiyaan. In alignment with the Environmental (Protection) Act of 1986, we methodologically handle both degradable and non-degradable waste streams. To ensure effective Solid Waste Management, the university's housekeeping team meticulously collects biodegradable and non-biodegradable waste are separated at the source. For proper channelizing collect sewage waste from residential areas, hostels, staff quarters, colleges, hospitals, and canteen/mess facilities, a system introduced for the Liquid Waste Management from sewage to a state-of-the-art sewage treatment plant (STP) with a robust recycling capacity of 1,100 kilo liters per day. Our university diligently adheres to the updated Bio Medical Waste Segregation guidelines (2016) where the clinical waste collected and sorted into bags (Yellow, Blue & Red Categories) labelled are dispatched to Synergy Waste management (P) Ltd. for safe disposal in every 48 hours. The colleges and hostel campuses are consistently updated and maintained to be pollution free. For contributing positive health and sustainability, an establishment of composting biodegradable waste into Bio compost and vermicompost has been prepared.

In non-medical disciplines, students engage in mini projects, field visits, and industry internships as mandatory components of their second-year and final research endeavors.

Ltd., Sun Pharmaceuticals Ltd., and academic institutions like Jamia Hamdard University, Rajiv Gandhi Law University, Astitva Foundation, facilitate research opportunities, field visits, and internships through student exchange programs. The university's approach encompasses a wide array of student-centric techniques, such as seminars, case studies, field and industrial projects, live-case discussions, educational excursions, participation in intra and inter-university activities, expert talks, workshops, brainstorming sessions, role-playing, and group discussions.

Integrated and interdisciplinary learning, aligned with the Credit-Based Choice System (CBCS) and the National Education Policy (NEP), involves Skill and Ability enhancement and Generic electives courses, fostering cross-disciplinary collaboration and content delivery.

For instance, within the realm of experiential learning, initiatives such as Longitudinal Patient Care, where groups of postgraduate students in the medical field are mentored by doctors throughout a patient's journey from admission to discharge, exemplify the hands-on approach adopted to enhance learning outcomes. Similarly, the Faculty of Science organized an activity focusing on Electronic Spectra of Transition Metal Complexes, aimed at fostering participatory learning among its students. Furthermore, the Faculty of Education employed student-centric methodologies such as Problem-Solving through Microteaching activities to cultivate critical thinking and practical skills among their students. We emphasize evidence-based learning by involving students in patient evaluation, monitoring, therapeutic administration, quality assessment, and clinical trials, thereby enhancing their understanding of patient care outcomes.

The university's commitment to technological advancement is evident in the provision of adequate ICT infrastructure tools in approximately 93% of our classrooms, including LCD screens, Wi-Fi/LAN connectivity, smart boards, and audio-visual

facilities. Moreover, both students and faculty members utilize renowned MOOC platforms such as SWAYAM, NPTEL, ProQuest, DOAJ, SHODHAGANGA, e-PATHSHALA, and Coursera to augment their teaching and learning capabilities.

Google Meet and Google Classroom serve as primary platforms for conducting online classes, disseminating study materials, and administering assignments and projects. Additionally, platforms like Google Meet, WebEx, and Zoom are employed for conducting Value Added Courses, mentoring sessions, and counseling sessions, as well as co-curricular and extracurricular activities such as webinars and workshops, enriching students' overall learning experiences.

The university libraries are fully automated and offer seamless access to a plethora of resources, including textbooks, reference materials, print journals, and subscribed e-resource databases like EBSCO, DELNET, and SCC, catering to the needs of both students and faculty members alike.

This comprehensive analysis serves to identify curriculum and methodological gaps, facilitating the implementation of

targeted remedial measures to enhance overall educational effectiveness. Moreover, students are provided with detailed explanations of program learning outcomes and graduate attributes during orientation programs. Furthermore, a multitude of workshops, orientation sessions, refresher courses, and faculty development programs on Outcome-Based Education (OBE) have been organized by the Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) to equip faculty members with the necessary tools and insights to effectively implement these principles in their teaching practices.

Our research infrastructure is both ample and state-of-the-art, comprising facilities for pre-clinical trials, well-equipped laboratories outfitted with the latest equipment, and specialized research centers tailored to support diverse fields of inquiry. To further bolster research excellence and productivity, the University Research Council has been established, tasked with overseeing and evaluating the performance of faculty members, scholars, and students engaged in research activities.

A systematic approach to fostering research excellence is adopted through a series of workshops and seminars, which emphasize good research practices, ethical considerations, clinical and laboratory protocols, intellectual property rights (IPR), research methodology, and industry-academic collaboration. Additionally, the university organizes guest lecture series featuring distinguished scientists to enrich the research capacity of our academic community.

Central to our research promotion efforts is the Central Research and Incubation Center (CRIC), serving as a centralized hub for interdisciplinary research initiatives. Under this

framework, various support mechanisms are in place, including seed funding for faculty and students, scholarships for Ph.D. scholars, financial assistance for conferences, publication and patent incentives, and research awards.

The revenue-sharing mechanism for consultancy services is clearly outlined in the policy, with funds collected through bank drafts/cheques or cash receipts, ensuring transparency and accountability.

To further enhance awareness and understanding of IP generation and management, as well as consultancy practices, the university regularly organizes capacity-building programs. These initiatives aim to sensitize students and faculty members across diverse disciplines including Medicine, Dentistry, Pharmacy, Physiotherapy, Nursing, Fine Arts, Management, Science, Engineering, and Technology.

Engineering labs foster innovation and the Physical Education department offers extensive sports facilities. Even the Department of Agriculture has a dedicated area for practical training. Research is centralized, and IT support ensures seamless learning. The extensive library network caters to diverse disciplines, bolstered by online resources. Amidst the COVID-19 pandemic, the University swiftly adapted with an e-library and online learning platforms.

In compliance with MCI standards, the medical college also maintains a Central Animal House and a Bio-medical Waste Disposal Unit.

Chhatrapati Shivaji Subharti Hospital, boasting beds, offers specialized treatment across various specialties and super specialties at subsidized rates. Equipped with 24x7 emergency services, the hospital is complemented by essential facilities including a blood bank, pharmacy, and NABL accredited clinical laboratories. Diagnostic services such as digital X-rays, sonography, CT scans, and MRI further enhance patient care. With extensive operation theatre complexes, intensive care units, neonatal and paediatric care units, and specialized

centres for HIV diagnosis and counselling, the hospital ensures comprehensive healthcare services

Daily OPD attendance exceeds MCI norms, and the hospital operates general clinical and super specialty OPDs regularly. Boasting 964 beds and modern ICUs, the hospital consistently maintains a bed occupancy rate of over 75%, surpassing MCI requirements.

Adjacent to the main hospital is a dental hospital, providing vital services and contributing to major OT procedures. Both undergraduate and postgraduate students gain invaluable experience treating patients from diverse backgrounds, learning a wide range of outpatient therapy techniques.

These libraries offer a range of services, including internet access to databases like EBSCO, DELNET, J-Gate, Sage Database, India E-Library, SCOPUS, and SCC Online. They also provide access to Shodhganga and E-Shodhsindhu. In-house services such as plagiarism checking, circulation, reference, reprography, and digital library facilities are available.

The libraries are equipped with KOHA, an open-source library automation system used worldwide by various institutions. KOHA supports MARC format for catalogue data and offers web-based access through browser clients. It includes modules for acquisitions, circulation, cataloguing, serials management, authorities, reporting, label printing, and more. KOHA is multilingual, translatable, and compliant with library standards, ensuring interoperability with other systems. Its web-based interfaces are built using standard web technologies, making it platform-independent.

KOHA is fully functional and complete automation was implemented in our University in the 2020-21. Plans are underway to enhance library security with digital flap barrier integration and RFID for entry and book issue management. Overall, the libraries at the University are well-equipped with modern technology and resources to support the academic and research needs of faculty, students, and scholars.

Swami Vivekanand Subharti University has a robust IT infrastructure to support teaching, learning, and administrative processes. With over 300 WiFi access points installed across the campus, hostels, and colleges, students can enjoy free internet access via mobile OTP login. The university utilizes Cisco Meraki network infrastructure, including the latest MX-450 Firewall and over 50 MS-125 Switches at the core distribution layer and 60 switches at the access layer, connected through a 10G fibre optic network on a mesh topology. There are more than 1900 computers across the University for Use with access to the standard software and Internet access.

The campus is fully WiFi-enabled, providing 24x7 internet access. IT facilities are regularly upgraded, overseen by an in-house IT cell led by a Chief Technical Officer and a team of technical experts. The infrastructure includes Dlink access points for secure WiFi coverage using MAC authentication, digital flap barriers for library security, and tablets for paperless conferences. The S-Touch Mobile App facilitates communication for staff, while a 2GBPS bandwidth ensures high-speed connectivity.

Other upgrades include a firewall upgrade, Cisco Meraki installation, and the implementation of 10G Cisco L3 and L2 switches for better connectivity. The university has also upgraded its call center with IVRS facilities and customized online examination software. The library automation system has been upgraded from Libsys to Koha, and IP surveillance with audio capabilities has been implemented. Access control systems have been upgraded with biometric authentication, and digital kiosk machines have been installed in every college for student convenience and ERP integration.

The Production Control Room and Master Control Room further enhance capabilities, providing resources for educational lectures, lab recordings, digital documentation, webinars, seminars, live streaming, and interviews. Overall, these resources and collaborations underscore the University's commitment to leveraging technology for the creation and dissemination of educational content, enriching both the learning experience for students and the accessibility of knowledge to a broader audience.

The University has established a range of physical, cultural, and academic support services for students, faculty, and staff, with clearly defined systems and procedures for their upkeep and utilization. A structured process governs the purchase and maintenance, involving proposal submission, quotation solicitation, and verification by both the Hon'ble Vice Chancellor and Finance Officer.

Students have unrestricted access to hostel facilities, though permission from the warden is required for organizing group programs, as stipulated in official notifications. Academic support facilities necessitate Deans to submit applications to the Hon'ble Vice Chancellor via the Registrar for approval, ensuring coordination and discipline.

Laboratories adhere to standard operating procedures for furnishing and maintenance, while the Library, overseen by the Librarian, establishes administrative and maintenance policies through biannual committee meetings. The Sports Committee manages routine maintenance of sports facilities and equipment.

The Information Technology Department, led by the Chief Technical Officer, addresses IT-related matters such as computer lab upkeep and in-house ERP systems. A maintenance committee oversees repairs and upkeep of all campus facilities.

Utility departments maintain thorough logbook records, documenting the receipt of issue calls and the time taken for resolution, ensuring accountability and efficiency.

The core tenets of governance for any organization, including our university, revolve around decentralization and participatory management. Through a participatory approach, the Board of Studies within the departments operates including Senior and Junior faculty members, Alumni and External Specialists. Subsequently, decision of the Faculty Board is forwarded to Academic Council for approval and the Executive Council for final confirmation.

b) **Financial and Empowerment:** The Executive Council of the University has delegated significant financial autonomy, empowering departments to procure necessary resources such as books, instruments, and everyday items as deemed appropriate to ensure the streamlined decision-making processes and efficient resource utilization at the departmental level.

6.3.1 - The Institution has effective welfare measures for teaching and non-teaching staff and other beneficiaries.

The university has a welfare policy, a promotion avenue, and a method for evaluating employee performance. Teachers are subject to performance-based appraisals, which are paid for; policies are in place; and there are multiple criteria for authorization and recognition on websites and social media. Welfare initiatives such as All forms of leaves, insurance, and medical benefits under group health insurance are provided to members of their immediate family in a cashless manner. Academic facilities are available for conferences and workshops and the allowances along with the regular benefits, such as the provided fund or RF Special rewards for intellectual property rights, research papers, and winning honours, both mandatory and optional. Regular bus transportation is available, as well as field tours, industry visits and recruitment events. The scholarship is available to the staff members' immediate family members as well, with cost reductions. The staff under the insurance scheme was given almost free treatment on priority during the COVID. In compliance with the established guidelines, the university also offers residential facilities to HRA, or non-teaching professionals. For staff members' children, the university provides a well-appointed creche with a play room, a sleeping area and a nursing area.

6.4 - Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1 - Institutional strategies for mobilisation of funds and the optimal utilization of resources

The Finance and Executive Committees of the University ensure that resources are utilised to the utmost extent possible. Every component college establishes a budget for operations related to instruction, research, and facility improvement. Fee collection (registration fees, tuition fees, transfer fees, migration fees, annual fees, processing fees, medal deposits, donations, examination fees, fines and penalties, evaluation fees, convocation fees, sports, and so forth) is the main method used to mobilise internal resources, whereas research funds and consulting fees are the main sources of external revenue. Additional sources include government subsidies for professional and educational programmes, government efforts for certain hospital treatment facilities, and certain philanthropic gifts to universities and hospitals. The Purchase Committees provide the full and optimal use of the available resources. In order to determine the genuine value for money, the committee obtains quotations from many suppliers and verifies the amount, quality, technical details, and specifications of numerous goods. All expensive things are paid for using AMC/CMC by the university. Every item that breaks down is delivered to the University's maintenance and repair unit for repair. Items that are deemed irreparable are subsequently delivered to the Condemnation Board for ultimate disposal.

6.4.3 - Institution conducts internal and external financial audits regularly

The University undertakes its own internal audit mechanism annually to evaluate and certify the income-expenditure and

capital expenditure in order to maintain checks and balances in the internal working. Under the direction of certified internal auditors, a team of experts thoroughly examines and verifies every voucher pertaining to the transactions of every fiscal year. The compliance report is delivered to the principals of the constituent units as well as the university after the income and spending figures have been carefully checked. The University has a strong internal auditing system in place, but it has also hired a third-party professional organisation to conduct routine external audits. This agency operates autonomously and provides the Hon'ble Vice Chancellor with confidential reports. The relevant supporting documentation is made available for any questions. When the audit team finds minor errors or omissions and commissions, precautions are taken, rectification is completed right away, and care is taken to prevent similar problems in the future. In addition to assisting the external auditors in accomplishing justifiable goals with the least amount of disruption to business, the finance officer collaborates with them.

Swami Vivekanand Subharti University upholds a rigorous waste management system rooted in environmental stewardship. We diligently implement the principles of the 3Rs: Reduce, Reuse, and Recycle. We actively contribute to the National Mission and objectives of Swachh Bharat Abhiyaan. In alignment with the Environmental (Protection) Act of 1986, we methodologically handle both degradable and non-degradable waste streams. To ensure effective Solid Waste Management, the university's housekeeping team meticulously collects biodegradable and non-biodegradable waste are separated at the source. For proper channelizing collect sewage waste from residential areas, hostels, staff quarters, colleges, hospitals, and canteen/mess facilities, a system introduced for the Liquid Waste Management from sewage to a state-of-the-art sewage treatment plant (STP) with a robust recycling capacity of 1,100 kilo liters per day. Our university diligently adheres to the updated Bio Medical

Waste Segregation guidelines (2016) where the clinical waste collected and sorted into bags (Yellow, Blue & Red Categories) labelled are dispatched to Synergy Waste management (P) Ltd. for safe disposal in every 48 hours. The colleges and hostel campuses are consistently updated and maintained to be pollution free. For contributing positive health and sustainability, an establishment of composting biodegradable waste into Bio compost and vermicompost has been prepared.
