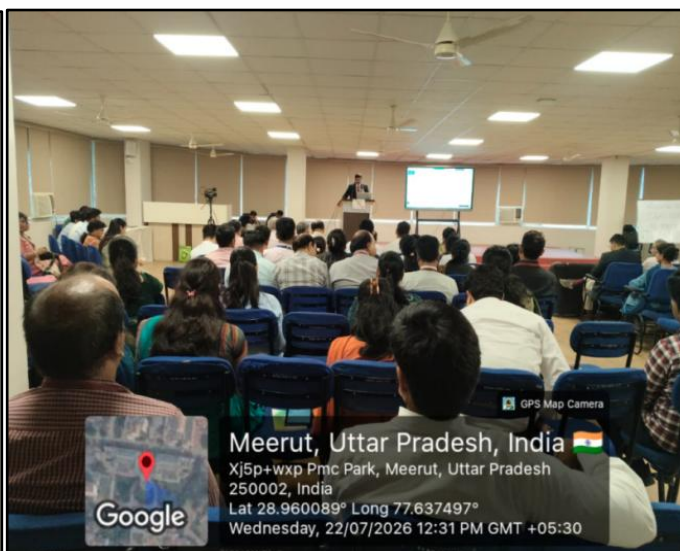
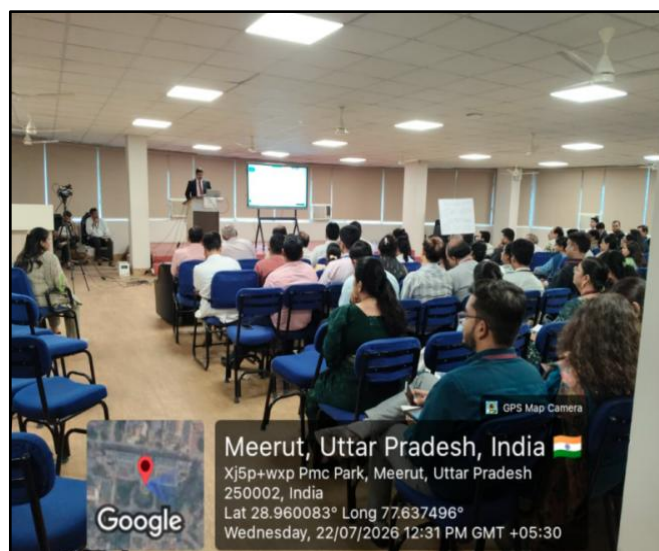

The meeting commenced with a welcome address by the Director, IQAC, who also introduced the external experts who joined the meeting online.

With the permission of the **Hon'ble Vice Chancellor**, the Director, IQAC, initiated the discussion on the agenda items, which were taken up one by one. **The following agenda items were discussed during the meeting:**

Agenda: 1	To confirm the minutes of the IQAC meetings held on 3rd & 4th April 2025 and 18th March 2026.
Discussion	The Director, IQAC welcomed all members and placed before the House the Minutes of the IQAC Meetings held on 3rd & 4th April 2025 and 18th March 2026 for confirmation. The members reviewed the proceedings, deliberations, resolutions and action points recorded in the previous meetings. The committee acknowledged that the minutes accurately reflected the discussions and decisions taken during the earlier meetings.
Resolution	The Minutes of the IQAC Meetings held on 3 rd & 4 th April 2025, and 18 th March 2026 were unanimously confirmed by the committee without any modification.
Agenda: 2	To consider the Action Taken Report (ATR) of the IQAC meetings held on 3rd and 4th April 2025 and 18th March 2026.
Discussion	The Director-IQAC presented the Action Taken Report of the IQAC meetings held on 3rd and 4th April 2025 and 18th March 2026. It was recalled that, based on the decisions taken on various agenda items during the IQAC Meeting held on 3rd and 4th April 2025, a Consolidated Activity Schedule was prepared and, with the approval of the Hon'ble Vice Chancellor, circulated to all faculties, colleges, and departments of the University for its effective implementation. It was further reminded that all faculties, colleges, and departments had subsequently been requested to adopt and implement the Consolidated Activity Schedule systematically for the forthcoming academic years as well, ensuring timely execution of the activities and continuous quality enhancement across the University. Further, the Director, IQAC, informed the members that during the compilation of the Action Taken Report (ATR) for the IQAC meetings held on 3rd and 4th April 2025, it was observed that the following agenda items require further action and, therefore, need to be continued until their successful implementation. - To establish further Memoranda of Understanding (MoUs) with industries and national/international institutions, facilitating the integration of courses into the curriculum that emphasize competency development, employability, entrepreneurship, and skill enhancement in accordance with sub-criterion 1.1.3. It was also informed that only active MoUs will be considered. - To discuss department-wise offering of Value-Added Courses (VACs), ensuring over 90% student registration for Value-Added Courses for a satisfactory percentage



of beneficiaries in accordance with sub-criteria 1.3.2 and 1.3.3. – It was informed that at least 90% of students must enrol in a value-added course, with efforts made to ensure that more than 70% of students complete the course.

- To ensure that all faculty members, including Heads of Departments, Deans, and Principals of faculty/colleges, serve as mentors, and that all Undergraduate, Post Graduate, and Ph.D. students are assigned mentors, to fulfill the requirements of sub-criterion 2.3.4 regarding the mentor-mentee ratio of the university. Special emphasis was placed on the Faculty of Medicine, which shall ensure that all its faculty members are formally designated as "Mentors" and that all UG, PG, and Ph.D. students are assigned as "Mentees." The Faculty of Medicine shall maintain complete mentor-mentee records and ensure effective implementation of the mentoring system in accordance with the prescribed guidelines.
- To review and update the experience details and other relevant fields in the University's EMS, in accordance with sub-criterion 2.4.3.
- To consider sub-criterion 2.6.2, i.e., incremental performance in the pass percentage of final year students. – Under this agenda item, the following statistics were presented by the Director, IQAC:

At this point, it was informed that all Faculties and Colleges must take necessary measures to improve the passing percentage of students. The members were further advised to implement appropriate corrective measures to reduce the gap between the number of students admitted and those who ultimately enroll. Such efforts should focus on enhancing student retention, improving enrollment conversion, and ensuring greater academic continuity.



- To discuss the sub-criteria 3.7.2, i.e., Presence of a functional Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) with Institutions/ industries in India and abroad for academic, clinical training/internship, on-the-job training, project work, student/faculty exchange, collaborative research programs, etc.
- To discuss the requirement of sub-criteria 5.2.2, i.e., the number of placement/self-employed/ professional services of outgoing students. Under this agenda item, the Director, IQAC informed the house that the report of the University Training & Placement Cell must include comprehensive details of all students of all Programmes who have been placed as well as those who are self-employed across all Faculties and Colleges of the University. It was further emphasized that the total number of graduated students reported by the Training & Placement Cell in its Annual Report must strictly correspond with the official graduation data provided by the Controller of Examinations of the University.
- To incorporate an e-ENPR (electronic-English News Paper Reading) session into the program timetable. Under this agenda item, the Director, IQAC informed the House that this activity is not being implemented uniformly across all Faculties, Colleges, and Departments of the University. The House emphasized that necessary action shall be taken to incorporate this activity into the regular academic timetable of all Faculties, Colleges, and Departments to ensure its systematic and consistent implementation.
- To conduct group discussions and PowerPoint presentations for the students. Similarly, under this agenda item, the Director, IQAC informed the House that this activity is not being implemented uniformly across all Faculties, Colleges, and Departments of the University. The House emphasized that necessary action shall be taken to incorporate this activity into the regular academic timetable of all Faculties, Colleges, and Departments to ensure its systematic and consistent implementation.
- To identify and designate English-speaking zones within faculty/colleges and implement a mandatory English-speaking policy in these identified areas. Similarly, under this agenda item, the Director, IQAC informed the House that this activity is not being implemented uniformly across all Faculties, Colleges, and Departments of the University. The House emphasized that necessary action shall be taken to incorporate this activity into the regular academic timetable of all Faculties, Colleges, and Departments to ensure its systematic and consistent implementation.
- To prepare and submit a monthly report on the progress of the Academic Bank of Credit (ABC) and the Automated Permanent Academic Account Registry (AAPAR). Under this agenda item, the Director, IQAC informed the House that, as



resolved in the IQAC Meeting held on 03rd and 04th April 2025, Dr. Chetan Vishal, Additional Registrar, was required to submit a progress report on the implementation of the Academic Bank of Credits (ABC) and APAAR initiatives to the Registrar of the University during the last week of every alternate month. The Registrar was further required to review the report and forward it to the Hon'ble Vice-Chancellor for his kind perusal. However, it was observed that this process has not been implemented in accordance with the decision of the IQAC. The House directed the concerned authorities to ensure strict compliance with the earlier resolution and to submit the progress reports regularly within the stipulated timeline.

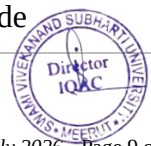
Similarly, the Director, IQAC informed the House that several agenda items listed below from the IQAC Meeting held on 18th March 2026 pertained to the timely compilation of finance-related AQAR metrics. As these metrics are linked to the relevant Financial Year, it was emphasized that the associated activities and documentation must be completed within the stipulated financial year to ensure timely data compilation, compliance, and accurate reporting for accreditation and quality assurance purposes.

Discussion	The Director, IQAC proposed that free sexual and reproductive health care services must be provided to the University's students in alignment with UN SDG indicator 3.3.4. The



committee deliberated on strengthening student healthcare services by providing accessible reproductive health counselling, awareness programmes, preventive healthcare, health screening, menstrual hygiene awareness, vaccination support and counselling services through the University Hospital.

Under this the following agenda was also informed by the Director, IQAC:

- The Times Higher Education (THE) Impact Rankings under UN Sustainable Development Goal (SDG) 3: Good Health and Well-being, Indicator 3.3.4, evaluate whether universities provide free sexual and reproductive health-care services, including information, counselling, education, diagnosis, treatment, and referral services to their students.
- The University, through its constituent medical institutions and Chhatrapati Shivaji Subharti Hospital, already possesses the necessary infrastructure and qualified healthcare professionals to deliver comprehensive healthcare services to students. However, to strengthen institutional support for student well-being and to enhance the University's performance in the THE Impact Rankings, it is proposed to formalize a university-wide policy for providing these services free of cost.

The proposed services may include:

- Free medical consultation relating to sexual and reproductive health.
 - Confidential counselling and guidance by qualified medical professionals.
 - Awareness, education, and preventive health programmes.
 - Screening, diagnosis, treatment, and referral services, wherever required.
 - Health education materials and awareness campaigns promoting responsible and informed health practices.
- The implementation of this initiative shall be coordinated by the Chhatrapati Shivaji Subharti Hospital, in collaboration with the concerned constituent colleges.
 - The Hospital shall also maintain appropriate records, issue necessary notifications, publish the policy on the University website, and organize periodic awareness programmes to ensure wide dissemination and compliance with the requirements of THE Impact Rankings SDG Indicator 3.3.4.

Role of the Faculties/Colleges:

- Nominate a Faculty Coordinator to coordinate with the Chhatrapati Shivaji Subharti Hospital regarding implementation of the initiative.
- Disseminate information among students regarding the availability of free sexual and reproductive health-care services.
- Organize awareness programmes, workshops, seminars, expert talks, health education sessions, and orientation programmes in collaboration with the Hospital.



- Identify and refer students, wherever appropriate and with due sensitivity, to the Hospital for counselling, consultation, diagnosis, treatment, and follow-up care.
- Encourage student participation in preventive health initiatives, health screening camps, and awareness campaigns.
- Maintain records of awareness activities conducted by the college and Documentation and evidence required for national and international rankings, accreditation, and quality assurance processes.
- Display and circulate the University's policy, contact details of the designated health facility, and information regarding available services through notice boards, websites, student handbooks, and digital platforms.
- Provide logistical support for organizing health camps and outreach programmes within the college premises.

Role of Chhatrapati Shivaji Subharti Hospital

- Provide free consultation, counselling, diagnosis, treatment, and referral services.
- Ensure availability of qualified medical professionals, including gynecologists, urologists, dermatologists (STI care), psychologists/counsellors, and nursing staff.
- Organize periodic health camps and awareness programmes in collaboration with constituent colleges.

The Director, IQAC also requested that the data may kindly be provided to the IQAC as and when requested in the format mentioned below, along with the relevant supporting documents/ reports.

- Strengthening the University's counselling and psychological support services through qualified counsellors, psychologists, psychiatrists, and mental health professionals, as required.
- Organizing regular mental health awareness programmes, workshops, seminars, orientation sessions, stress management programmes, life skills training, suicide prevention awareness, substance abuse prevention, and wellness campaigns.
- Conducting regular parent engagement programmes, including parent orientation sessions, webinars, counselling interactions, and awareness initiatives to promote collaborative support for students' mental health and well-being. Developing digital and printed educational resources, self-help materials, awareness campaigns, and communication platforms for students and parents.
- Establishing mechanisms for periodic monitoring, feedback collection, outcome assessment, and continuous improvement of student wellness initiatives.

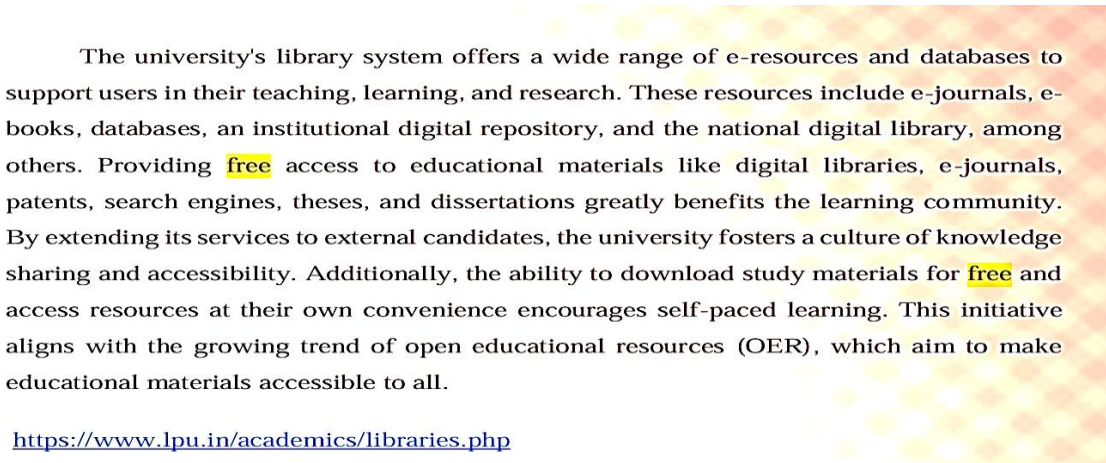

Members emphasized that every department should conduct at least one safety drill every academic year and maintain proper records.							
Resolution	The committee resolved that a University-wide Campus Safety and Emergency Preparedness Framework shall be implemented. It was decided that the Disaster Management Committee shall prepare an annual action calendar, maintain documentary evidence, and submit reports to IQAC. Action By: Disaster Management Committee							
Agenda:21	To consider offering free access to the educational resources for those not studying at the university in support of UN SDG Indicator 4.3.1 with reference to the University							



	Policy on Free Access to Educational Resources for those Not Studying at the University.
Discussion	The Director-IQAC informed the House that promoting lifelong learning and extending educational opportunities to the wider community is an important requirement under the Sustainable Development Goals. Under this agenda item, the Director, IQAC presented the following screenshot for consideration:  The university's library system offers a wide range of e-resources and databases to support users in their teaching, learning, and research. These resources include e-journals, e-books, databases, an institutional digital repository, and the national digital library, among others. Providing free access to educational materials like digital libraries, e-journals, patents, search engines, theses, and dissertations greatly benefits the learning community. By extending its services to external candidates, the university fosters a culture of knowledge sharing and accessibility. Additionally, the ability to download study materials for free and access resources at their own convenience encourages self-paced learning. This initiative aligns with the growing trend of open educational resources (OER), which aim to make educational materials accessible to all. https://www.lpu.in/academics/libraries.php The committee discussed the University Policy on Free Access to Educational Resources and reviewed possibilities for providing selected learning resources to school students, alumni, competitive examination aspirants, healthcare professionals, industry personnel and members of the local community.
Resolution	The committee unanimously approved the implementation of the policy and directed the Central Library to identify educational resources by August 2026 that may be provided to external learners free of cost. Action By: Central Library
Agenda:22	To prepare detailed reports for each educational visit conducted by students (not enrolled at the University) at the University, to be compiled by the Central Admission Cell as documentary evidence in support of UN SDG Indicator 4.3.2 with reference to the University's "Lifelong Learning Access Policy".
Discussion	The Director-IQAC emphasized that a large number of school and college students, government and non-government officials, healthcare professionals, and other external visitors regularly visit the University for educational exposure. Such visits significantly contribute towards community engagement and lifelong learning. It was proposed that the Central Admission Cell of the university may be designated as the Nodal Office for coordination of all outside student visits and compile the data with supporting documents (<i>notice/brochure, report with colour photographs, duly sealed and signed attendance sheets, and press releases, if any</i>) of all outside students who visit the



University campus for educational purposes, career counselling and admission awareness sessions.

It was also proposed that the data of such activities can be maintained by the Central Admission Cell in the following format:

Discussion	It was proposed by the Director, IQAC, that free childcare facilities for staff and faculty members in alignment with UNSDG Indicator 5.6.5 may be provided. The committee discussed extending childcare support to teaching and non-teaching employees to promote employee welfare, gender equity and work-life balance.
Resolution	The committee resolved that the existing childcare support mechanisms shall be strengthened by including free childcare facilities for staff and faculty members. <i>Action By: Dr. Jyoti Gaur, HoD, Department of Home Science, Faculty of Arts & Social Science</i>
Agenda:26	To consider introducing a tracking mechanism to assess women's likelihood of graduating in comparison to men and to implement suitable measures to address any identified gap, in alignment with UN SDG Indicator 5.6.7.
Discussion	The Director-IQAC informed the house that gender-wise monitoring of student progression is an important quality indicator under international sustainability frameworks. Members discussed developing a systematic mechanism for tracking enrolment, retention, progression, examination performance and graduation rates separately for male and female students. It was also submitted that the Women Empowerment Cell should periodically review the findings and recommend corrective interventions wherever disparities are observed.
Resolution	It was resolved that the Controller of Examinations and the Women Empowerment Cell shall implement the proposed gender-wise student progression tracking mechanism and submit an annual report to the IQAC. The report shall present an analysis of gender-wise progression, retention, completion, and academic outcomes, thereby facilitating informed decision-making, promoting gender equity, and supporting continuous quality enhancement in accordance with the objectives outlined in the agenda item. <i>Action By: Controller of Examinations and Women Empowerment Cell</i>
Agenda:27	To consider the implementation of water-conscious building standards in alignment with UN SDG Indicator 6.3.4.
Discussion	The Director, IQAC, proposed that water-conscious building standards must be considered in alignment with UN SDG Indicator 6.3.4. The committee reviewed the University's commitment towards sustainable infrastructure development and discussed incorporating water-efficient building designs into all future construction projects. Members deliberated on rainwater harvesting systems, low-flow plumbing fixtures, wastewater recycling, groundwater recharge and water-efficient landscaping.
Resolution	The Chairperson of the Environmental Committee was entrusted to prepare technical guidelines based on national green building standards for adoption in future infrastructure projects. The committee also resolved that all new construction projects shall incorporate water-conscious building standards wherever technically feasible.

Agenda:28	To consider the adoption of water-conscious plantation practices in alignment with UN SDG Indicator 6.3.5.
Discussion	The Director, IQAC, proposed that water-conscious plantation practices may be adopted in alignment with UN SDG Indicator 6.3.5. The members discussed promoting sustainable landscaping practices through selection of indigenous plant species, drip irrigation systems, recycled water utilization and scientific horticultural management. The Dean, Faculty of Science, in coordination with the Horticulture Department, was suggested to prepare a comprehensive report on existing plantation practices and recommend sustainable improvements.
Resolution	The committee approved the preparation of a Water-Conscious Plantation Management Plan for the University campus by August 2026. <i>Action By: Dr Ravindra Kumar Jain, Officiating Dean, Faculty of Science</i>
Agenda:29	To consider conducting specific “Water Management Education Programs” for the local community in alignment with UN SDG Indicator 6.5.1.
Discussion	The Director, IQAC proposed that specific “Water Management Education Programs” for the local community must be conducted in alignment with UN SDG Indicator 6.5.1. The committee discussed the University's social responsibility towards promoting water conservation awareness among nearby communities. It was proposed that awareness programmes, demonstrations, exhibitions, workshops and village outreach activities be organized through the Environmental Committee, NSS, UBA and various Faculties.
Resolution	The committee approved the organization of Water Management Education Programmes both within the University campus and in the adopted villages to promote awareness regarding sustainable water conservation and management practices. It was further resolved that the Environment Committee shall prepare and submit a comprehensive calendar of these programmes by August 2026 to facilitate their timely and systematic implementation. <i>Action By: Environmental Committee</i>
Agenda:30	To consider providing off-campus water conservation support in alignment with UN SDG Indicator 6.5.3.
Discussion	It was proposed by the Director-IQAC that off-campus water conservation support in alignment with UN SDG Indicator 6.5.3 may be provided. Under this agenda item, the following was submitted by the Director, IQAC: • Need to collaborate with water agencies such as Jal Nigam, Jal Shakti, and NGOs • Collaboration to get certificate /award on good work/project done in this regard (Faculty of Science, Faculty of AYUSH) • Project with NGO or Government Agencies



	Conduct water quality testing in the surrounding community (Water Committee, Environment Dept) The committee deliberated on extending the University's technical expertise for water conservation initiatives beyond the campus. Members suggested involving the Departments of Civil Engineering, Agriculture and Faculty of Science in preparing technical solutions relating to rainwater harvesting, groundwater recharge, irrigation management and watershed development, etc. for nearby villages and institutions. The committee also discussed encouraging students to undertake field-based projects addressing local water conservation challenges under faculty supervision.
Resolution	The committee unanimously approved the proposal and resolved that multidisciplinary teams shall be constituted from the Department of Civil Engineering and the Agriculture Department by August 2026 to provide technical support for off-campus water conservation initiatives. <i>Action By: Department of Civil Engineering and the Agriculture Department</i>
Agenda:31	To consider implementing sustainable water extraction practices on and off campus in alignment with UN SDG Indicator 6.5.4.
Discussion	The Director-IQAC informed the House that sustainable management of groundwater resources has become an important component of institutional sustainability and is one of the key indicators under the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals. The committee discussed the need to scientifically monitor groundwater extraction, recharge mechanisms and water table levels within the University campus. Members deliberated upon maintaining records of borewells, water extraction points, groundwater recharge structures and annual water consumption patterns. It was further suggested that the University should also assess the sustainability of water extraction practices in nearby adopted villages and outreach locations wherever technical support is provided. The Environmental Committee was entrusted with the responsibility of preparing a comprehensive Water Extraction Report along with groundwater level assessment and recommending suitable conservation measures based on scientific observations.
Resolution	The committee unanimously approved the proposal and resolved that the Environmental Committee shall prepare a comprehensive Water Extraction and Groundwater Level Assessment Report covering both on-campus and off-campus initiatives by August 2026. <i>Action By: Environmental Committee</i>
Agenda:32	To consider cooperation with local, regional, national, or global governments on water security initiatives in alignment with UN SDG Indicator 6.5.5.
Discussion	The Director-IQAC highlighted the importance of collaborative partnerships with government agencies, local bodies and organizations working in the field of water security. The members discussed that the University possesses considerable technical expertise in environmental management, water conservation and community outreach, which can



	contribute significantly towards regional water security initiatives. The committee suggested identifying suitable government departments, municipal authorities, NGOs and community organizations actively working in this area. It was also proposed that collaborative activities such as awareness programmes, technical consultations, research projects and capacity-building initiatives be undertaken through Memoranda of Understanding wherever feasible. The members further recommended identifying local organizations in the Meerut region already engaged in water conservation activities for possible collaboration.
Resolution	The committee unanimously resolved that the Environmental Committee shall identify suitable government agencies, NGOs and community organizations working in the area of water security and prepare a roadmap for collaborative programmes in alignment with the University's sustainability objectives. Action By: Environmental Committee
Agenda:33	To consider promoting conscious water usage on campus and in the wider community in alignment with UN SDG Indicator 6.5.6 and 6.5.7.
Discussion	The Director-IQAC informed the House that promoting responsible water consumption among students, faculty members, staff and the surrounding community is essential for achieving long-term sustainability. Members discussed organizing awareness campaigns, workshops, exhibitions, competitions and outreach programmes focusing on water conservation, rainwater harvesting, prevention of water wastage and efficient utilization of available water resources. The committee suggested integrating these initiatives with activities conducted by the Environmental Committee, NSS, Unnat Bharat Abhiyan, various Faculties and student clubs. It was also proposed that awareness materials and water conservation messages be displayed across the campus to encourage responsible water usage among all stakeholders.
Resolution	The committee approved the proposal and resolved that the Environmental Committee shall coordinate awareness programmes on conscious water usage within and outside the campus, with NSS, and Unnat Bharat Abhiyan shall organize similar activities in adopted villages and nearby communities. Annual report shall be submitted to IQAC to include with UN SDG Indicator 6.5.6 and 6.5.7. Action By: Environmental Committee
Agenda:34	To assess the sustainability impact of battery-operated vehicles in alignment with UN SDG indicator 7.2.3.
Discussion	The Director-IQAC placed before the committee the need to assess the University's contribution towards sustainable transportation and reduction of greenhouse gas emissions. Under this agenda item the Director, IQAC submitted the following: ▪ Electric vehicles are available, but usage, fuel savings, and CO₂ reduction data are not tracked.



	• To maintain EV usage data (km/year) • To calculate petrol/diesel savings and CO₂ reduction • To assess solar-based EV charging feasibility ▪ The environmental and economic benefits of GAIL gas usage are not documented. • To calculate LPG cylinder replacement • To estimate monthly energy savings and CO₂ reduction • To document indoor air quality improvements ▪ Need to monitor, assess, and improve the Air Quality Index (AQI) through clean energy and sustainable practices. ▪ At present, there is no structured documentation or continuous monitoring of the Air Quality Index (AQI) within the university campus. Although clean energy initiatives such as solar energy, biogas usage, electric vehicles, LED lighting, and GAIL gas connections are in place, their impact on air quality improvement has not been quantified or reported. • To install AQI / air quality monitoring devices at key locations on the campus • To record periodic AQI data and analyse trends in air quality improvement Members discussed evaluating the environmental impact of battery-operated vehicles, conventional fuel consumption, solar energy utilization, campus green cover and related sustainability parameters. The committee recommended preparing a comprehensive assessment covering carbon emission reduction, energy savings and environmental benefits derived from existing sustainability initiatives.
Resolution	The committee unanimously approved the proposal and resolved that a comprehensive Sustainability Impact Assessment Report covering battery-operated vehicles and associated environmental indicators shall be prepared by the Dean, Faculty of Science, by August 2026 and will be submitted to the Chairperson of the Environment Committee of the University. Further, the final report will be submitted to IQAC for inclusion with UN SDG indicator 7.2.3. <i>Action By: Dr. Ravindra Kumar Jain, Officiating Dean, Faculty of Science, Chairperson of the Environment Committee</i>
Agenda:35	To initiate an energy-efficient renovation and green building process for at least newly constructed or under-construction buildings with certifications in alignment with the UN SDG indicator 7.2.1, with reference to the University Policy on Energy-Efficient Renovation and Buildings.
Discussion	The Director-IQAC informed the house that sustainable infrastructure development has become an important quality benchmark under national and international accreditation and ranking frameworks.



	Members discussed adopting recognized green building standards, such as IGBC, GRIHA, and BEE, for future construction and renovation projects undertaken by the University. The committee emphasized incorporating energy-efficient lighting systems, natural ventilation, renewable energy integration, water-efficient fixtures, environmentally friendly construction materials, and sustainable building practices into all new infrastructure projects. The Civil Engineering Department was suggested to study the requirements of various certification agencies and recommend the most appropriate framework for implementation at the University.
Resolution	The Committee unanimously approved the proposal and resolved that the Civil Engineering Department, Faculty of Engineering and Technology, shall examine the standards prescribed under IGBC, GRIHA, and BEE, and other concerned bodies. It was decided that the most suitable green building certification framework be identified and that a comprehensive implementation plan be developed for future construction and renovation projects. The implementation plan shall be submitted to the University's Construction Department by August 2026 for review and adoption. The Committee further resolved that the Civil Engineering Department shall prepare and submit an Annual Green Building Implementation Report to the Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) in support of UN SDG Indicator 7.2.1. The report shall serve as institutional evidence for submission to national and international ranking and rating agencies, including sustainability-related assessments. <i>Action By: Civil Engineering Department, Faculty of Engineering and Technology, Construction Department</i>
Agenda:36	To conduct community awareness/sensitization/ certificate programmes to learn about the importance of energy efficiency and clean energy in alignment with UN SDG indicator 7.4.1.
Discussion	The Director-IQAC informed the House that promoting awareness regarding energy efficiency and clean energy among the community is an important institutional responsibility under the Sustainable Development Goals. Under this agenda item the Director, IQAC submitted the following: • Outreach activities lack quantified impact data. • These programmes can be conducted in 5 adopted villages and the university's schools. • These programmes may be conducted by the NSS units and the energy department quarterly. • Specific reports in the prescribed format must be prepared and submitted to IQAC. The committee deliberated on organizing awareness campaigns, certificate programmes, workshops, seminars and extension activities focusing on renewable energy, energy conservation, energy-efficient technologies and climate-responsible practices. Members



	suggested that all Faculties should integrate such programmes with their outreach activities, while NSS, NCC and Unnat Bharat Abhiyan Unit may conduct similar awareness programmes in adopted villages and nearby communities. It was further recommended that subject experts from various Faculties be invited to deliver lectures and practical demonstrations to encourage community participation and strengthen environmental consciousness.
Resolution	The committee unanimously approved the proposal and resolved that all Faculties/Colleges shall organize community awareness programmes on energy efficiency and clean energy through extension and outreach activities as part of the University's sustainability initiatives. These activities must be part of their annual activity calendar. The Committee further resolved that the NSS, NCC, and Unnat Bharat Abhiyan Unit shall coordinate and facilitate such programmes in the University's adopted villages. All concerned Faculties/Colleges/Departments, and coordinating units shall maintain comprehensive documentary evidence of the activities conducted, including notices, attendance records, geo-tagged photographs, reports with outcome and other relevant supporting documents. The respective Faculties/Colleges/Departments shall submit the required documentary evidence to the Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) as and when called for, to report under relevant UN Sustainable Development Goal (SDG) indicators and national/international ranking and accreditation frameworks. <i>Action By: All Faculty/College/Departments, NSS, NCC and Unnat Bharat Abhiyan (UBA)</i>
Agenda:37	To consider providing direct energy efficiency services to the local industry in alignment with UNSDG indicator 7.4.3.
Discussion	The Director-IQAC informed the committee that higher educational institutions are expected to contribute towards industrial sustainability by extending technical expertise and innovative solutions for improving energy efficiency. Under this agenda item, the Director, IQAC submitted the following: • To organize workshops, training programmes, and technical awareness sessions on energy efficiency and sustainable energy practices for local industries through the Faculty of Engineering & Technology, thereby strengthening industry–academia collaboration and facilitating knowledge transfer. • To encourage Undergraduate (UG) and Postgraduate (PG) students to undertake industry-oriented projects in collaboration with local industries focusing on energy efficiency, renewable energy, energy conservation, and sustainable technologies as part of experiential learning and innovation. • To promote the design, development, testing, and commercialization of innovative products, prototypes, and technological solutions for energy efficiency through the Faculty of Science and the Faculty of Engineering & Technology in collaboration



	with industry, leveraging the University's IDEA Lab, Innovation Cell, and Startup Cell to foster research, innovation, entrepreneurship, and technology transfer. Members discussed involving students and faculty members in identifying practical solutions related to energy conservation, process optimization, renewable energy utilization and sustainable industrial practices. It was proposed that the Department of Mechanical Engineering, Electrical Engineering, Subharti Polytechnic College, Department of Biotechnology, Faculty of Pharmacy and Faculty of Science should allocate student projects addressing real-life industrial problems related to energy efficiency. The committee observed that such initiatives would simultaneously strengthen experiential learning, industry interaction, research output and community engagement.
Resolution	The committee unanimously approved the proposal and resolved that the Department of Mechanical Engineering, Electrical Engineering, Subharti Polytechnic College, Department of Biotechnology, Faculty of Pharmacy and Faculty of Science shall identify suitable industries and allocate a minimum of three UG/PG student projects each focusing on energy efficiency and sustainable industrial practices. The necessary action must be taken in August 2026, and a report on specific outcomes must be submitted to the IQAC as and when called for, to report under relevant UN Sustainable Development Goal (SDG) indicators and national/international ranking and accreditation frameworks. <i>Action By: Department of Mechanical Engineering, Electrical Engineering, Subharti Polytechnic College, Department of Biotechnology, Faculty of Pharmacy and Faculty of Science</i>
Agenda:38	To promote and monitor the inclusion of co-authors from low- and lower-middle-income countries in research publications, in alignment with UN SDG indicator 17.1.1.
Discussion	The Director-IQAC informed the House that international collaboration in research is an important indicator under global sustainability and ranking frameworks. Under this agenda item, the Director, IQAC informed the members that an official communication had been circulated via email in September, 2025 to all Faculties, Colleges, and Departments of the University, requesting faculty members and Ph.D. scholars to actively promote international research collaboration by including co-authors from low- and lower-middle-income countries in their research publications. This initiative was undertaken in alignment with UN SDG Indicator 17.1.1 to strengthen global research partnerships, enhance international collaboration, and improve the University's performance in sustainability and global impact rankings. Under this agenda item, the Director, IQAC, submitted the following: It is proposed that the faculty and research scholars of the university should work with the co-authors from low- and lower-middle-income countries in research publications.



- Low- and lower-middle-income countries: Low-income economies have a Gross National Income (GNI) per capita of \$1,175 or less, and lower-middle-income economies fall between \$1,176 and \$4,635.
- Conduct the activities under MoUs with institutions from these countries with explicit clauses on joint research, joint supervision, and co-authored publications.
- The R&D Cell of the university may introduce small seed grants or proposal-development support specifically for projects involving at least one co-author from a low- or lower-middle-income country.

It was also suggested that the Faculties/Colleges/Department may submit the quarterly report on International Co-authored Publications in the following format to the Research and Development Cell for its monitoring and expected outcome:

In many cases, the ATR merely states that the suggested actions will be implemented in the following academic year, which does not adequately demonstrate the effectiveness of the feedback mechanism. ▪ Further, it was proposed that to strengthen the feedback system and ensure meaningful implementation of stakeholder suggestions, feedback be collected twice



during the academic year, immediately after the completion of each semester. This will enable the concerned Faculties/Colleges to analyse the feedback, implement the suggested improvements during the subsequent semester of the same academic year, and present the actual implementation and its outcomes in the Action Taken Report.
